OVERVIEW

On December 9, 2023, Speak Up Scottsdale launch a questionnaire asking Community members share their thoughts on *"Libraries and Books"*.

73 community members answered 5 questions.

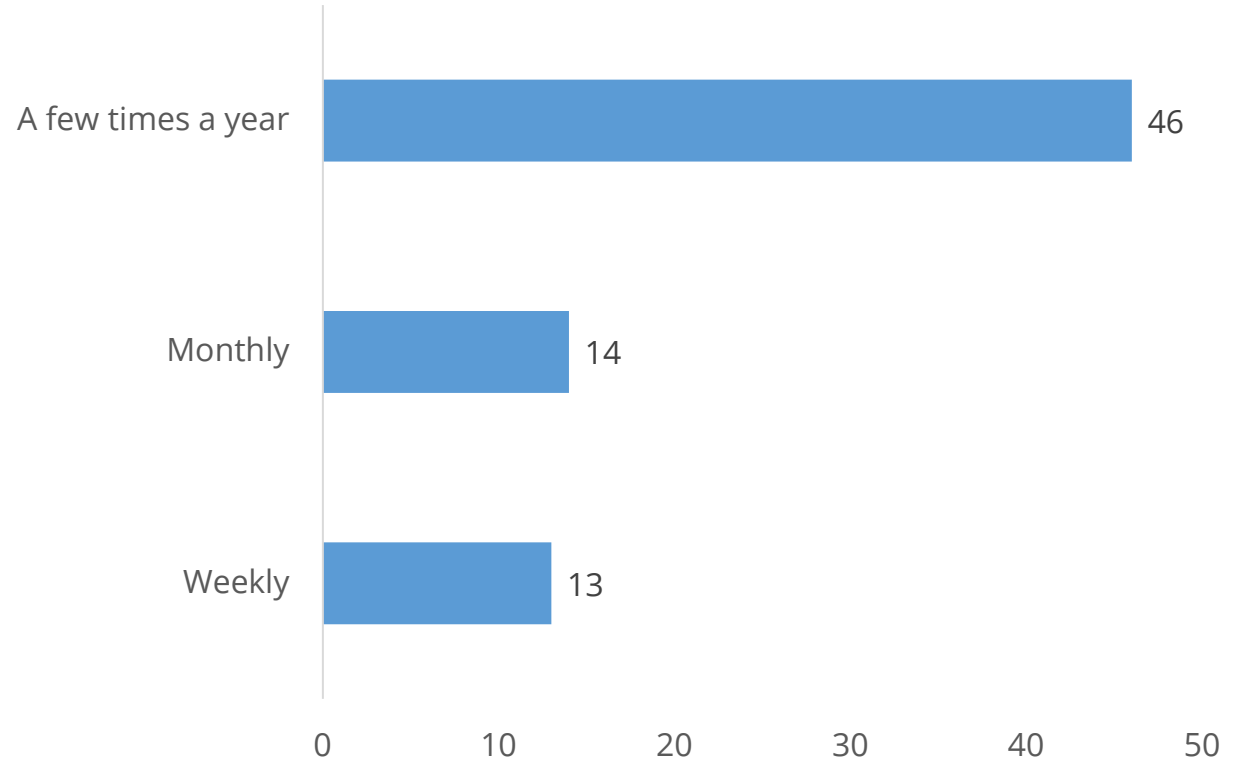
The questionnaire closed on December 31, 2023.



FREQUENCY OF LIBRARY(S) VISITS

Slightly less than half (46) of the 73 SUS members prefer to go to the library a few times a year.

Of the remaining 27 respondents: 14 members will go to the library monthly, and 13 will go weekly.



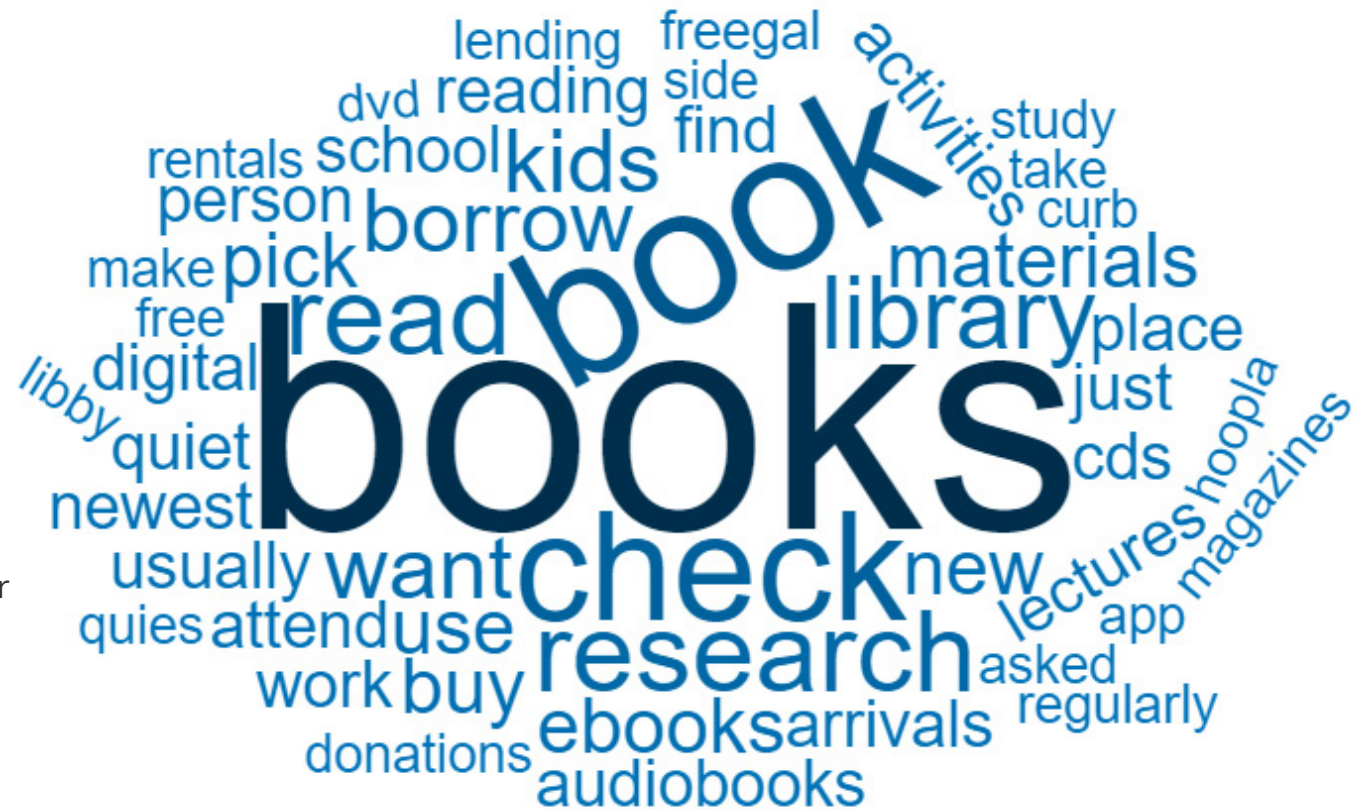

REASONS FOR GOING TO THE LIBRARY

The majority of responses reveal that borrowing and reading books, both physically and digitally, remain the core use of libraries. This shows that, despite increasing digitalization, physical books are still popular.

However, digital materials and e-learning are also gaining traction, resonating with the trend of digital transformation in every sector. Simultaneously, libraries are valued as places of learning, research, and community engagement, offering lectures, events, and spaces for study.

A small percentage of responses revealed non-utilization, suggesting that some people may not see the value in library services, or have found alternatives that suit their needs better.

REASONS FOR GOING TO THE LIBRARY

Nine categories were revealed. Please note that some of the members provided responses that supported more than one category.

The most frequently mentioned response was:

Borrowing, Reading Books, Material (41)

- Most of the responses fall within this category, indicating that the traditional use of libraries as a resource for borrowing books and reading materials remains strong, whether it's borrowing physical books or accessing them digitally.

Other frequently mentioned responses included:

Events, Lectures, Exhibits (11)

- Some responses show that people use the library's facilities to attend various events, revealing the role of libraries as community centers.

Digital Materials and E-Learning (10)

- This category houses activities related to digital borrowing, such as e-books, online newspapers, and audiobooks. This is a sign of libraries transitioning to the digital age.

Learning and Research (7)

- Patrons also see libraries as resources for learning, research, and studying. The activities range from lectures to researching materials for their children's school projects.

Social, Hangout, Meeting Place (5)

- Members like to use libraries as a place to hangout or have a business meeting.

Avoid Purchasing Books (5)

- Some members felt it is better to go to the library to borrow a materials rather than purchase.

Non-Use (5)

- A minor group of responses speak to those who do not use the library at all, or only rarely.

Volunteer | Make Donations 2

- Two member felt that libraries are for giving time or money.

Bookshop 1

- One enthusiastic patron declared *the bookshop is awesome*.

MOST ENJOYED BOOK GENRE

SUS members were asked to identify their book preference genre. The 73 members have diverse book genre tastes, of which:

- 17 members prefer non-fiction
- 13 members prefer autobiographies/biographies
- 10 Mystery
- 8 Action/Suspense
- 2 Crime Stories
- 2 Romance
- 1 Science Fiction

20 Other, grouped into these categories:

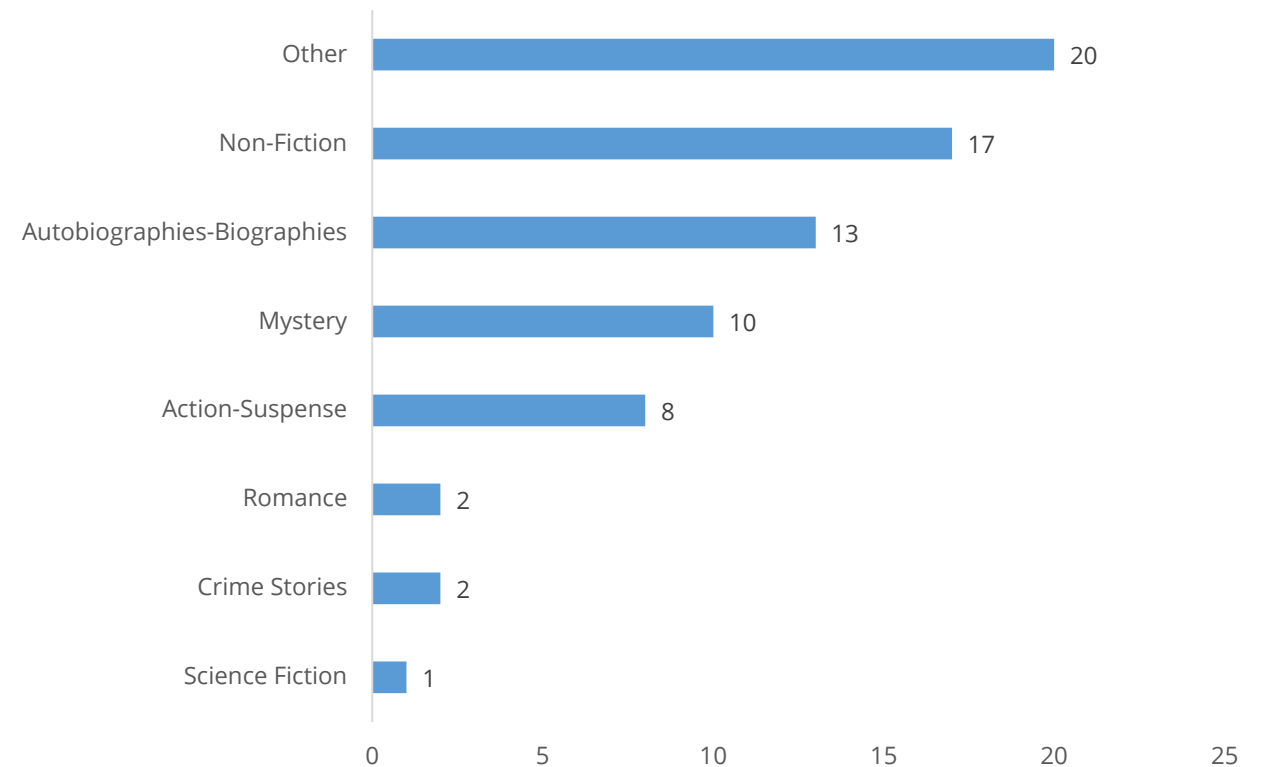

Book Genre Most Enjoyed

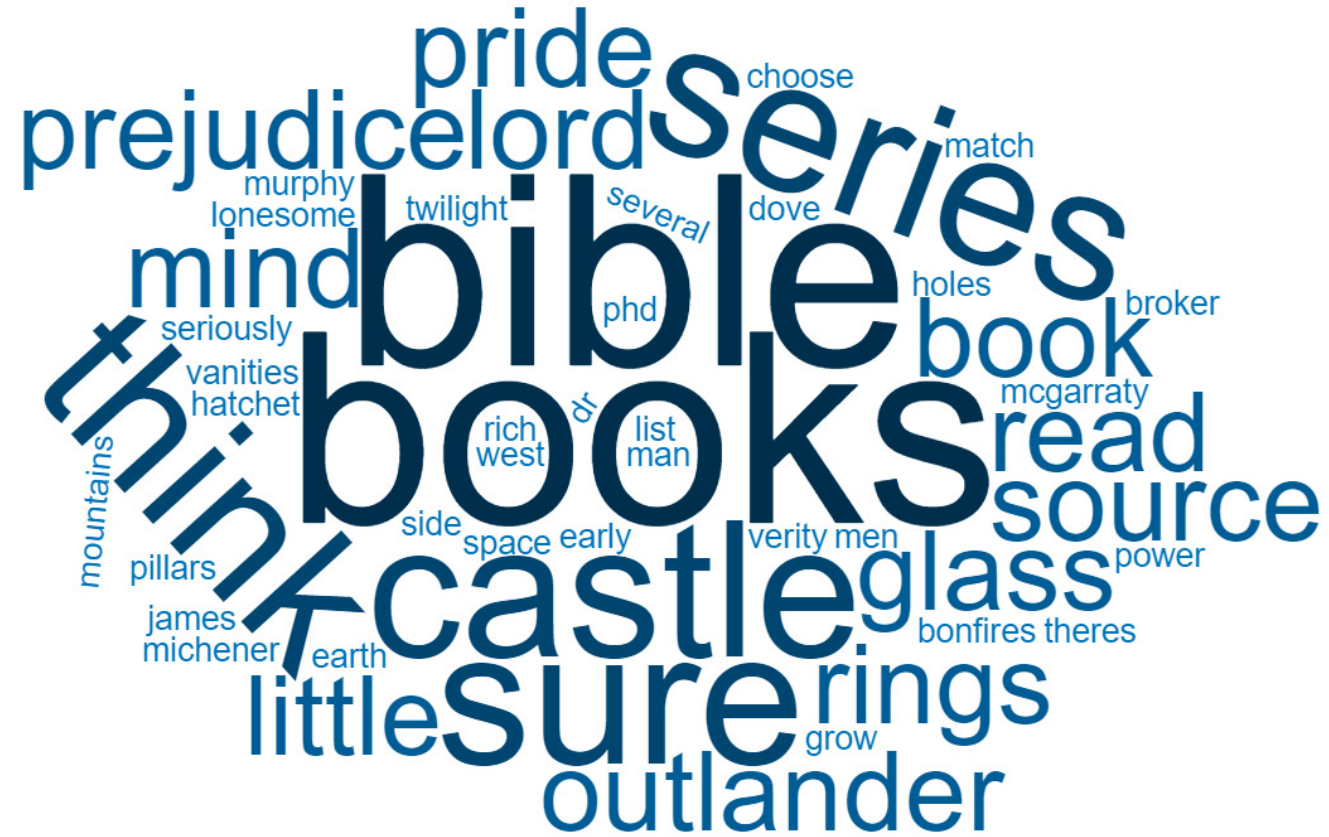


BOOKS WANTING TO READ MORE THAN ONCE

53 members provided a wide varieties of books (46 categories) that they would read more than once.

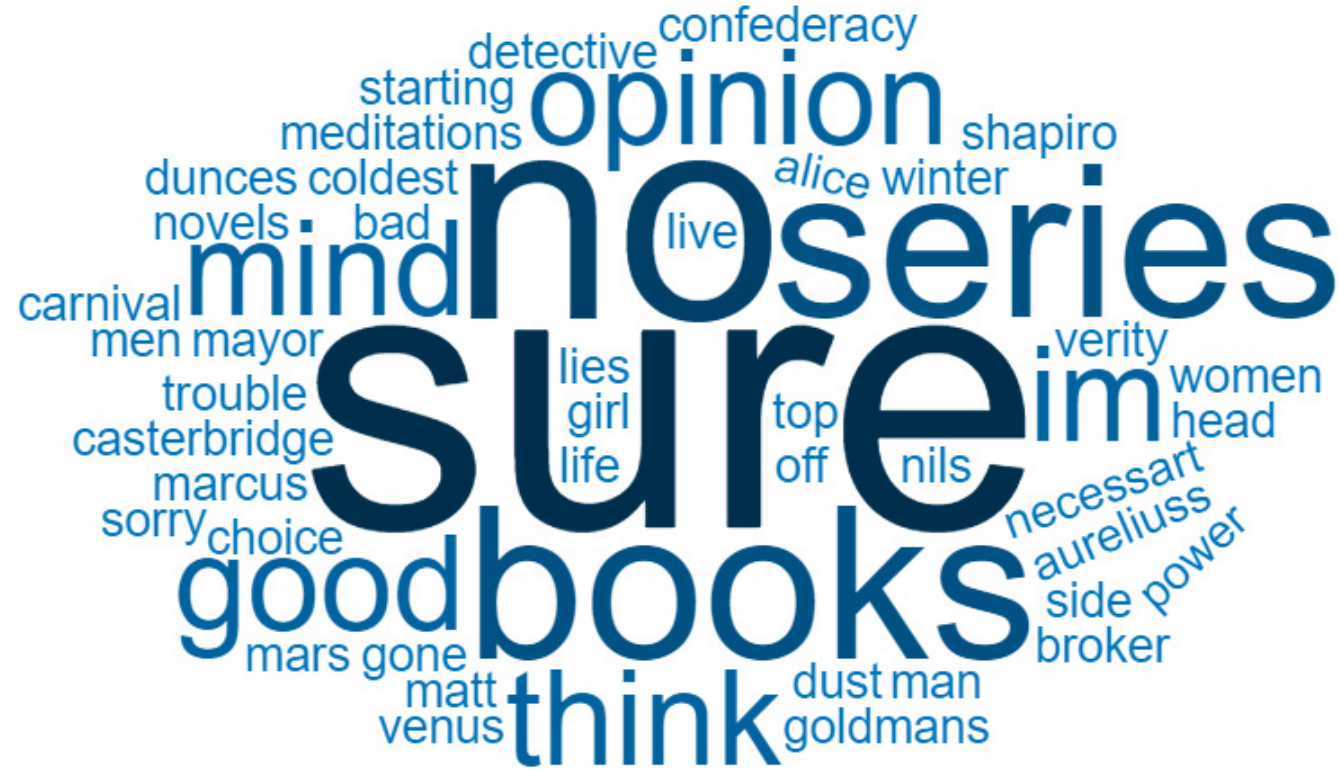

The overarching behavior among respondents is an appreciation of libraries as a source of free or low-cost access to educational materials, whether in print or digital form.

Libraries serve as cherished spaces for learning, education, reading for pleasure, and engaging with the community.

The convenience of digital services mirrors the wider societal shift towards online resources.

Meanwhile, a small portion of the population remains disconnected from library services for various reasons, outlining an opportunity for libraries to address this gap and explore ways to attract and serve these potential patrons.
