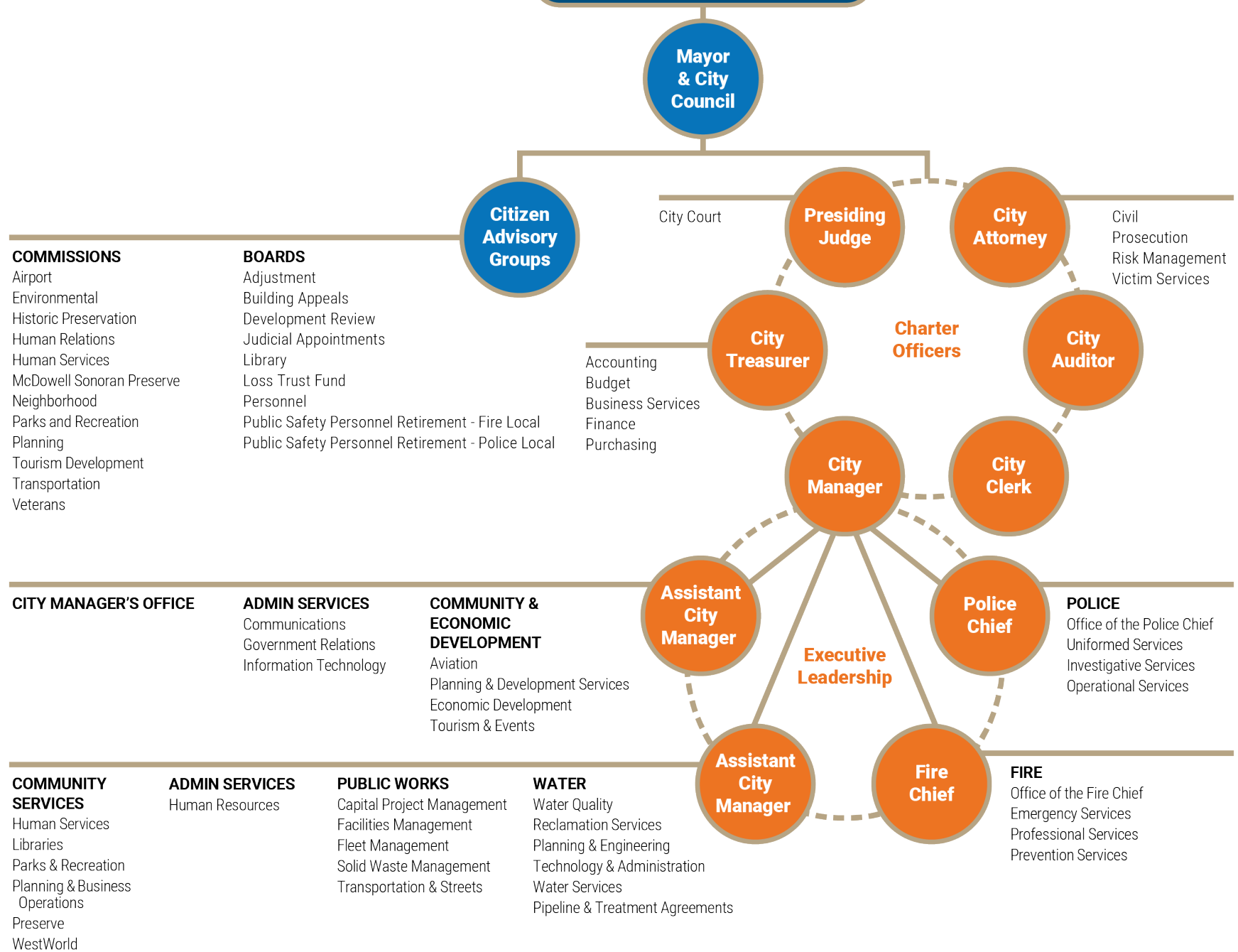

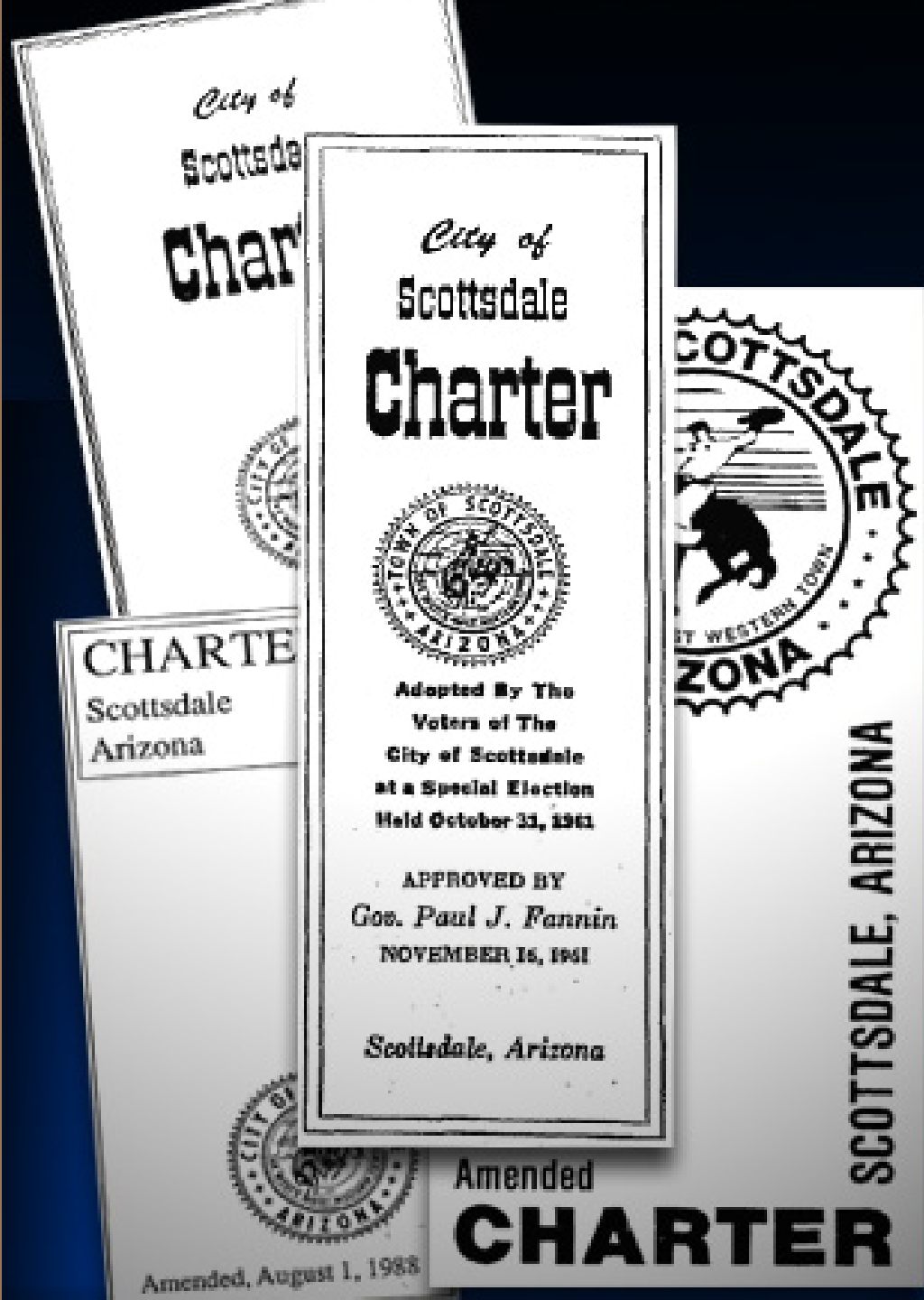

The City Charter

- Defines the city's powers and functions.
- Sets the governance structure including seven elected officials:
- Mayor and six Councilmembers and six city officers:
- City Attorney, City Auditor, City Clerk, City Judge, City Manager, City Treasurer
- Amending or modifying the charter requires a public vote.

Secs. 2-8—2-15. Reserved.**ARTICLE II. CITY COUNCIL****DIVISION 1. GENERALLY****Sec. 2-16. Mayor.**

The mayor shall sign all orders, together with warrants, drawn on the treasury. He shall execute all bonds, deeds, leases, conveyances, and all other instruments authorized by the council and requiring his signature. In addition to the requirements of this section, he shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. (Code 1972, § 2-301)

Charter references—Mayor generally, art. 2, §§ 3, 6, 7; mayor authorized to sign contracts, art. 8, § 1.

Sec. 2-17. Date and time of regular meetings.

The council holds regular meetings at 5:00 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday of each month. The mayor or four (4) members of the council may schedule additional regular meetings, or may cancel or reschedule any regularly scheduled meeting to any day or time of the same month, but not less than two (2) regular meetings shall be held each month. At the discretion of the mayor or four (4) members of the council, regular meetings that are scheduled to be conducted on consecutive days may be combined and held on either of the two (2) days, and shall be considered a single meeting.

Special meetings of the council may be scheduled by the city clerk at either the request of the mayor or four (4) members of the council.

A notice of regular meeting changes or scheduled special meetings shall be posted as required by law. (Code 1972, § 2-201; Ord. No. 2270, § 1, 11-6-89; Ord. No. 2499, § 1, 11-2-92; Ord. No. 3660, § 1, 12-13-05; Ord. No. 3967, § 1, 9-20-11)

Sec 2-18. Rules of Council Procedure.

Unless otherwise provided by law, the council, by majority vote, shall adopt a resolution setting forth Rules of Council Procedure. The process for amending these Rules shall also be by resolution. (Code 1972, § 2-201; Ord. No. 3967, § 2, 9-20-11)

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in divisions 3 and 4 of this article of the Code shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

City official means the mayor, members of the city council, and individuals appointed to serve on the city's boards, commissions, committees, task forces, and other appointed advisory groups.

City of Scottsdale Code of Ethical Behavior means the provisions set forth in divisions 3 and 4 of this article.

Ethics code means the City of Scottsdale Code of Ethical Behavior. (Ord. No. 3675, § 1, 5-2-06)

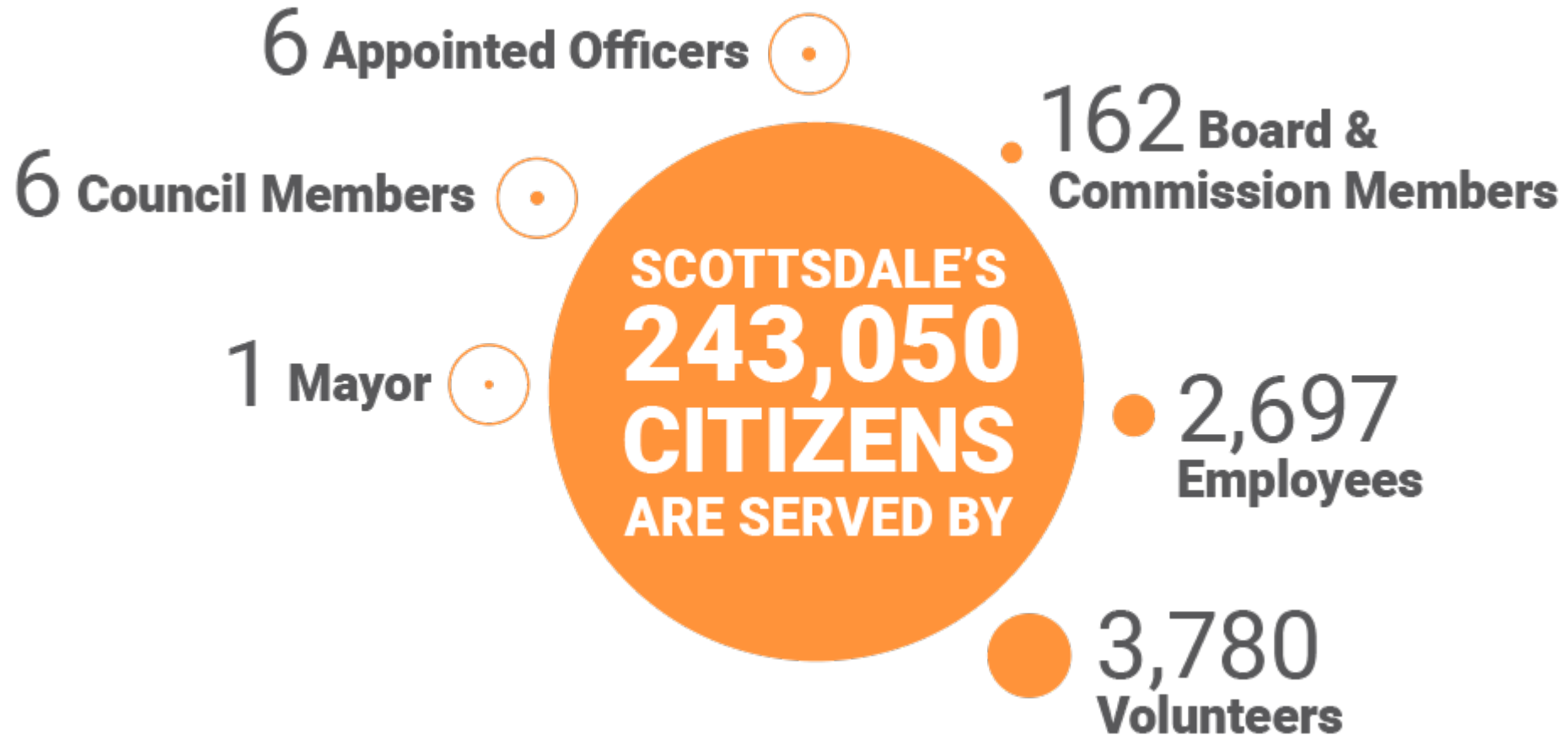

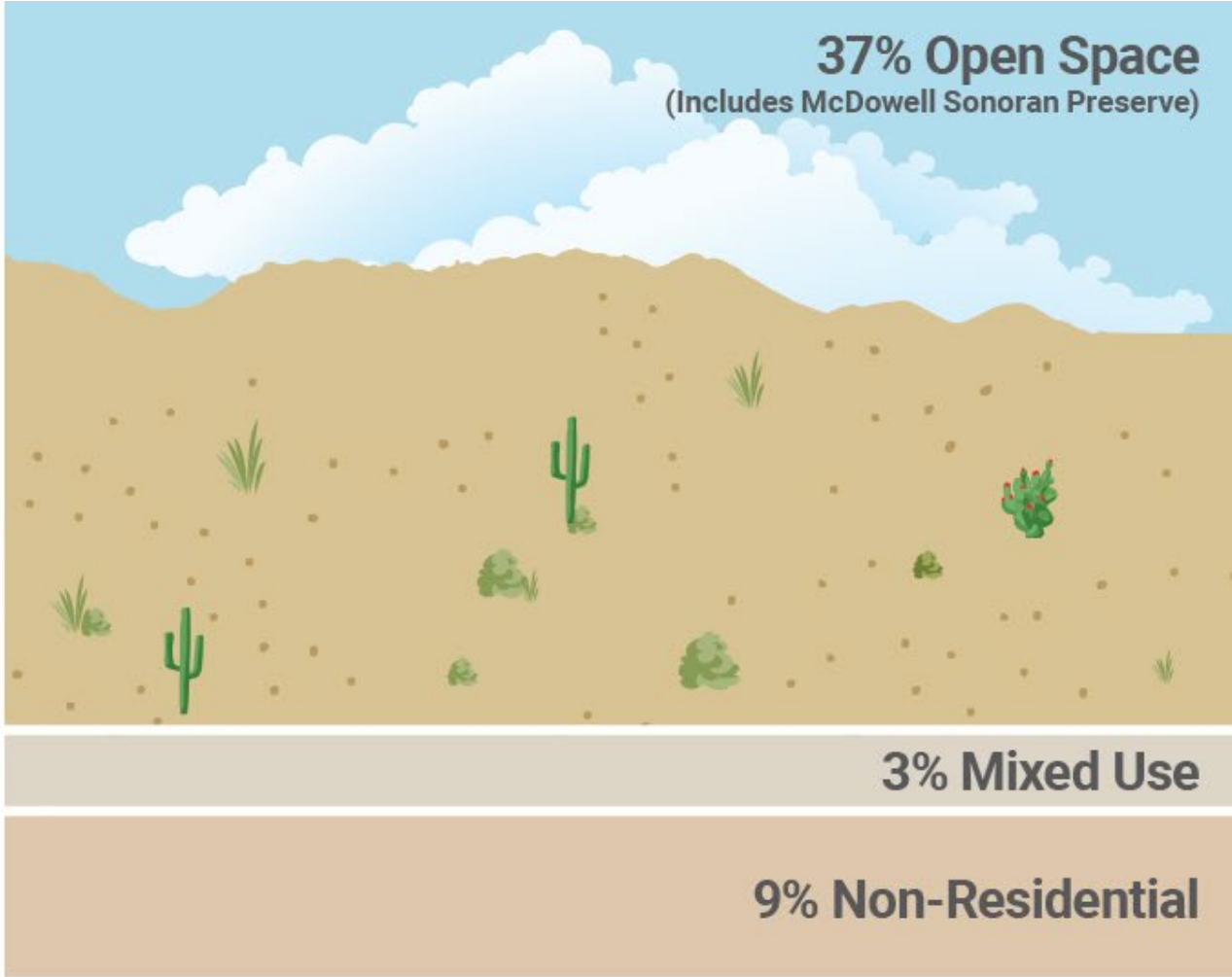

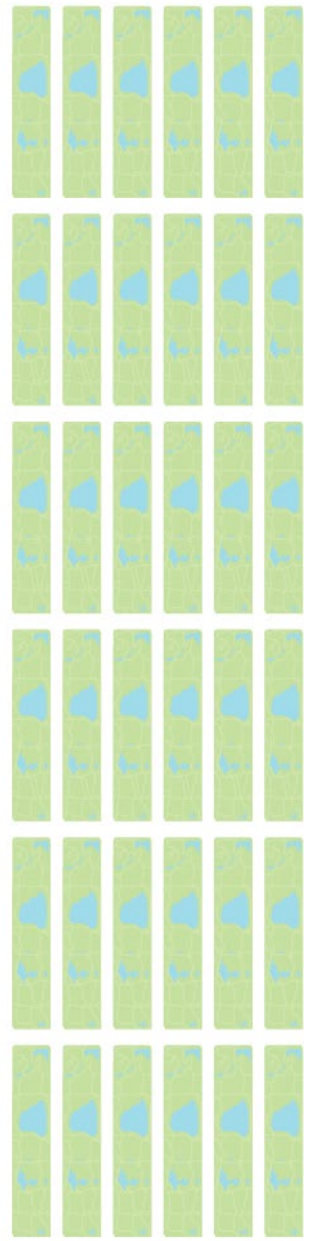

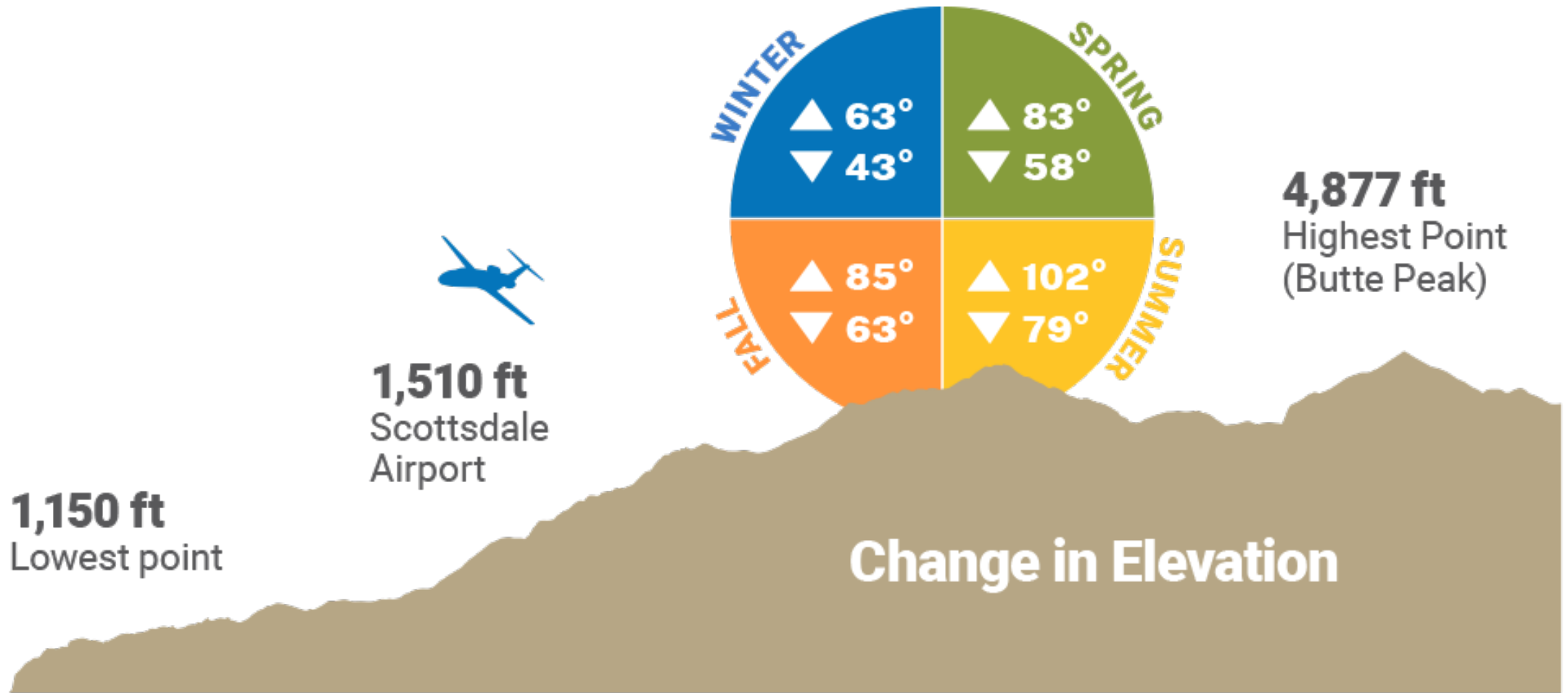

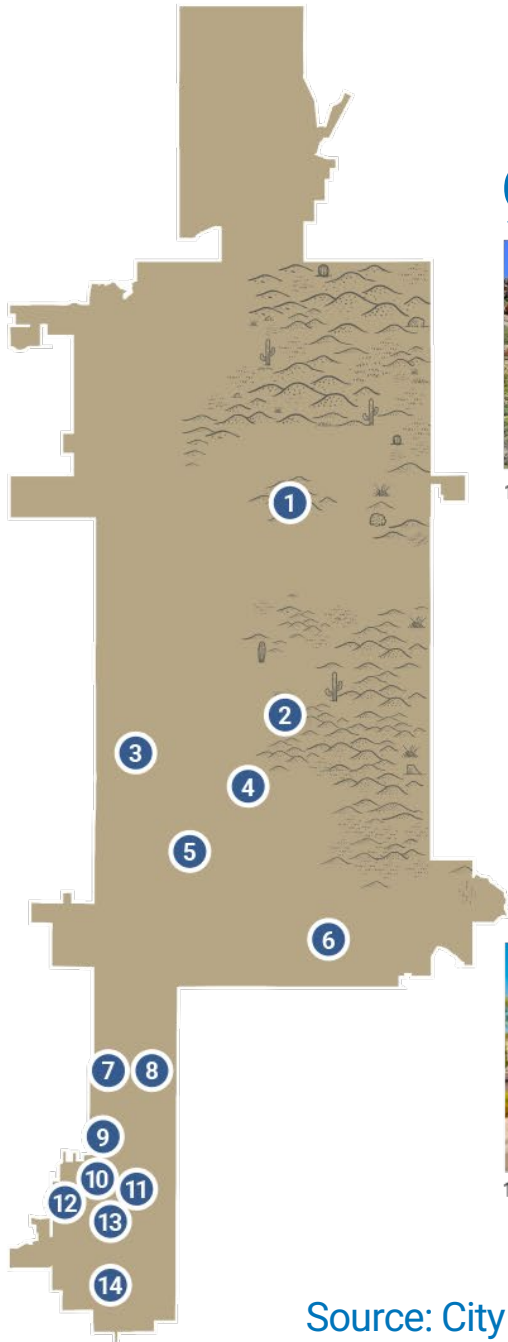

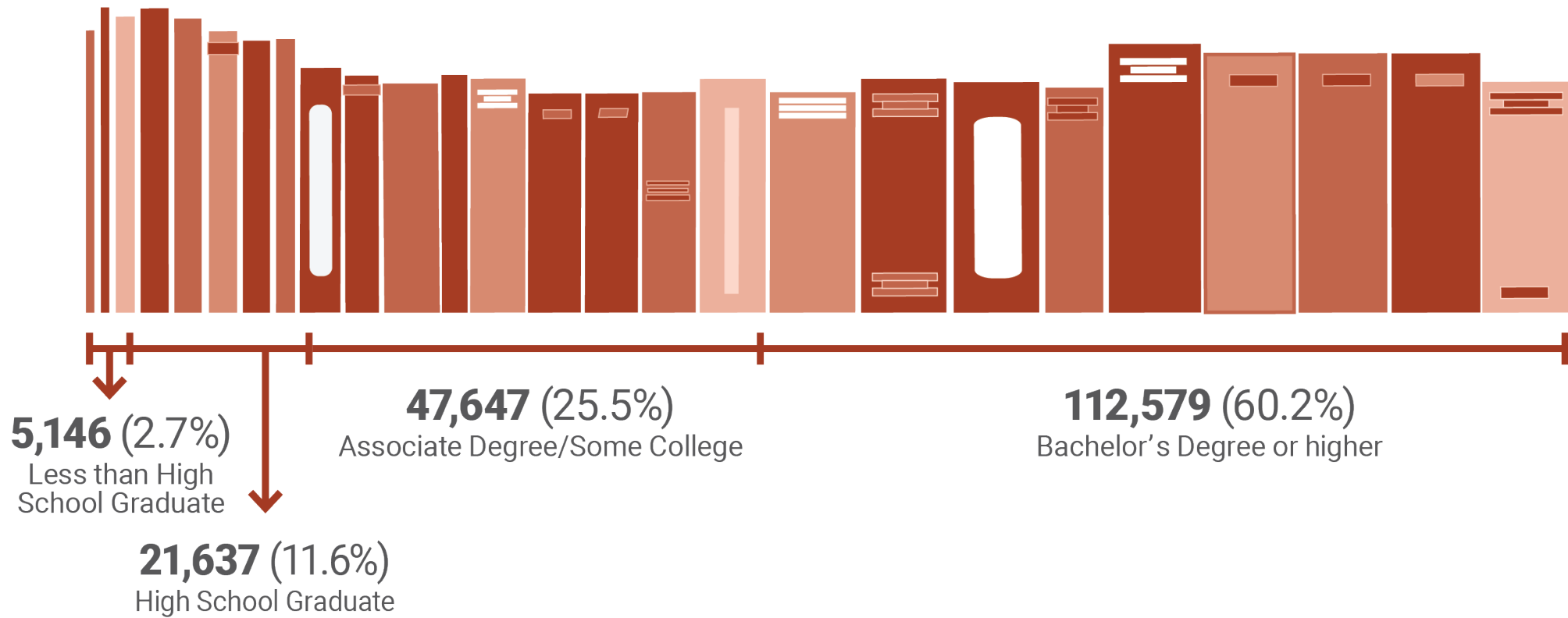

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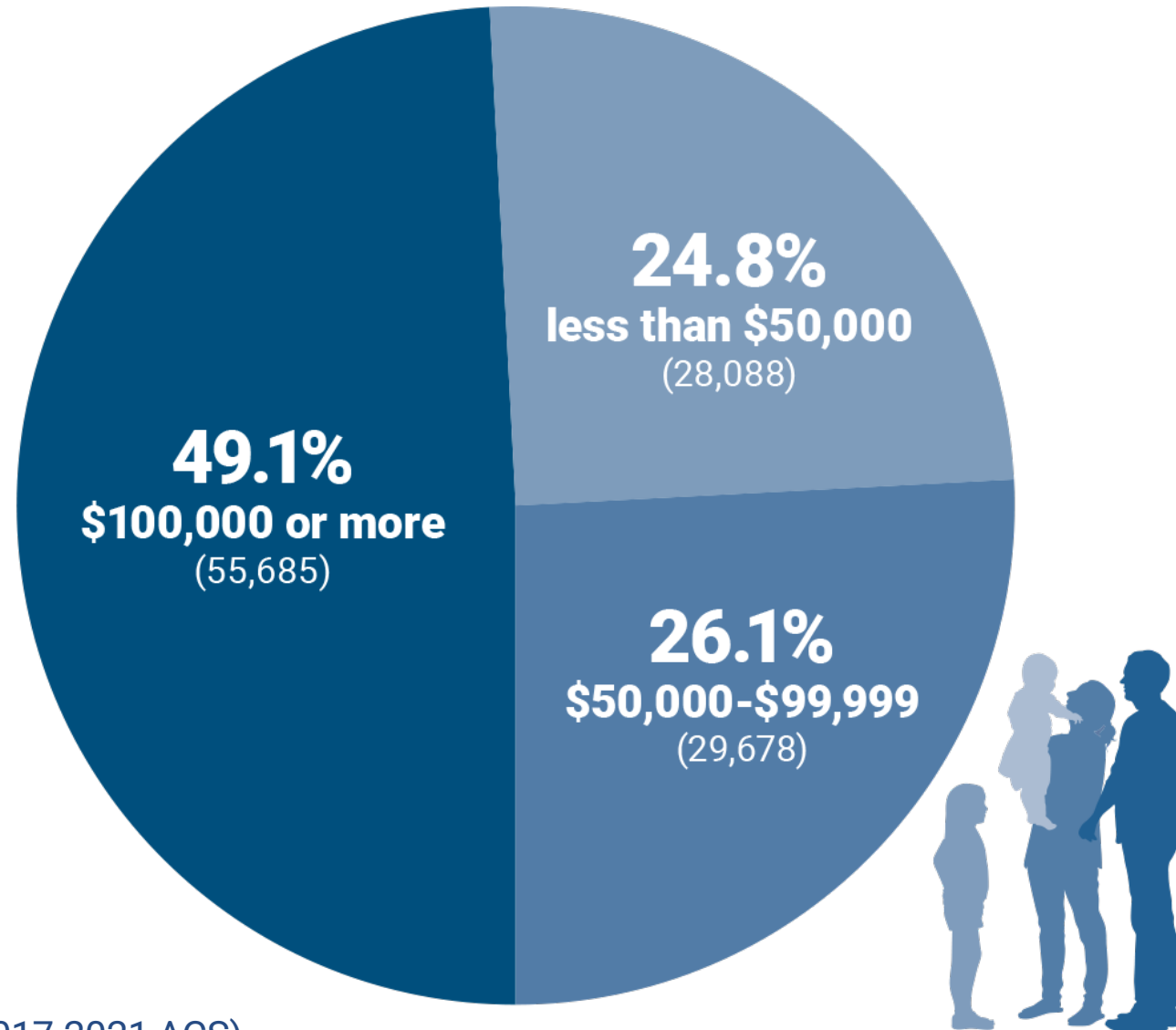

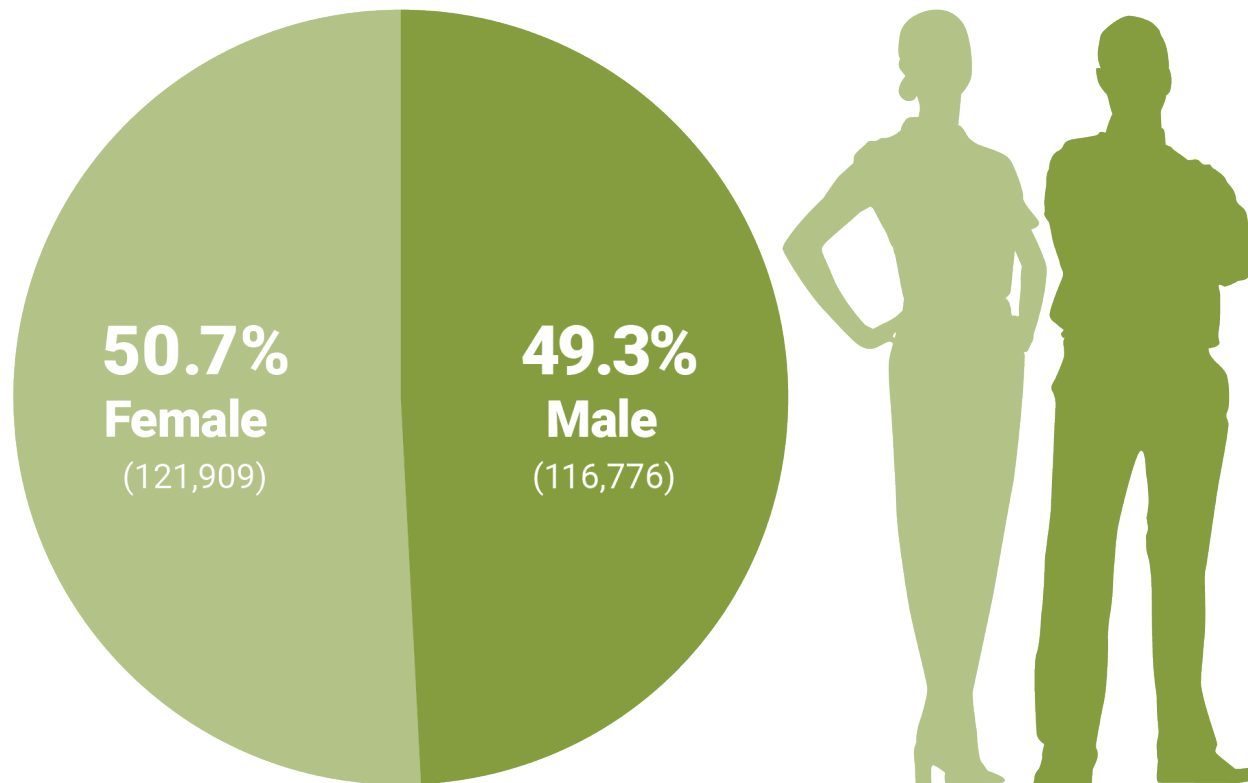

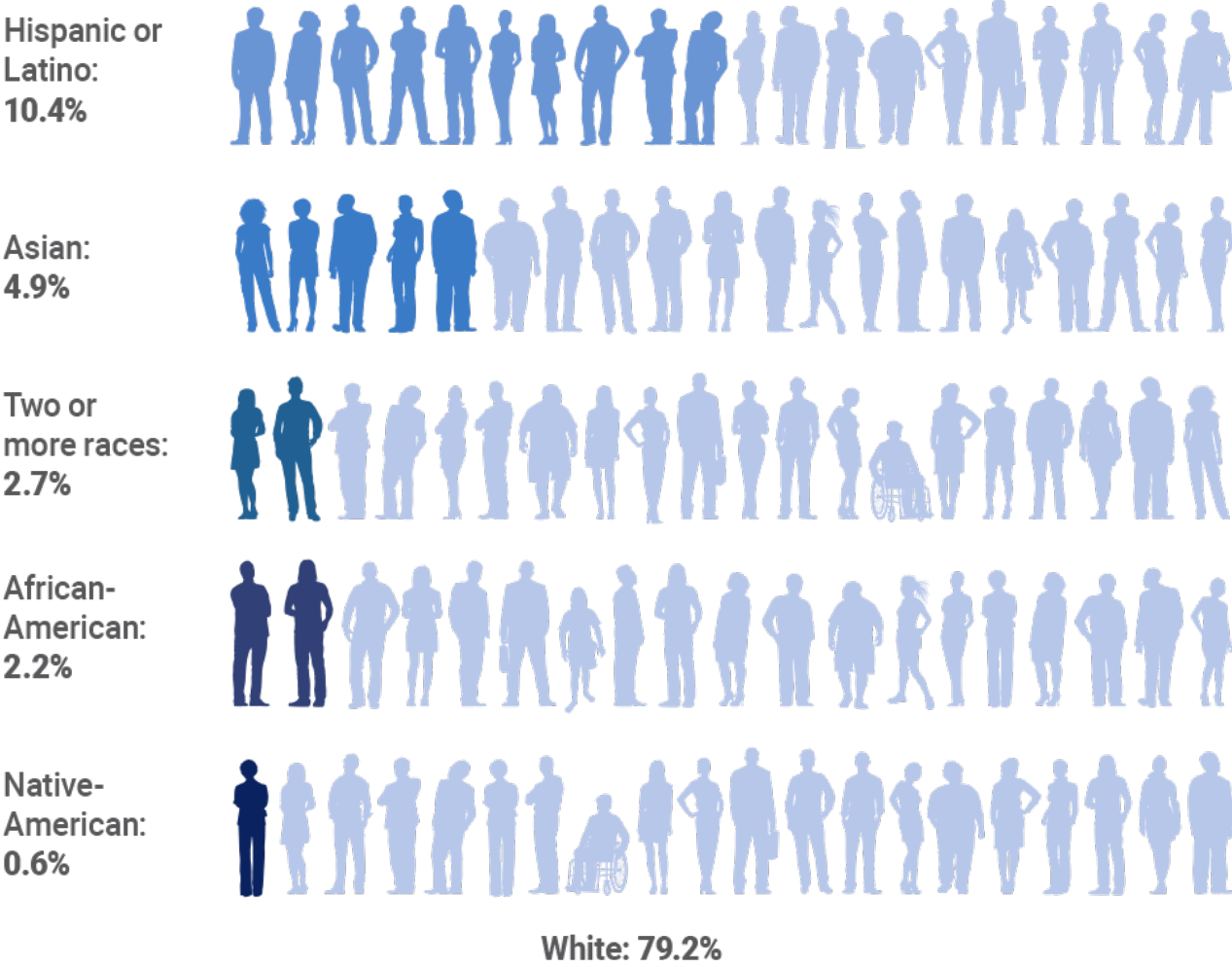

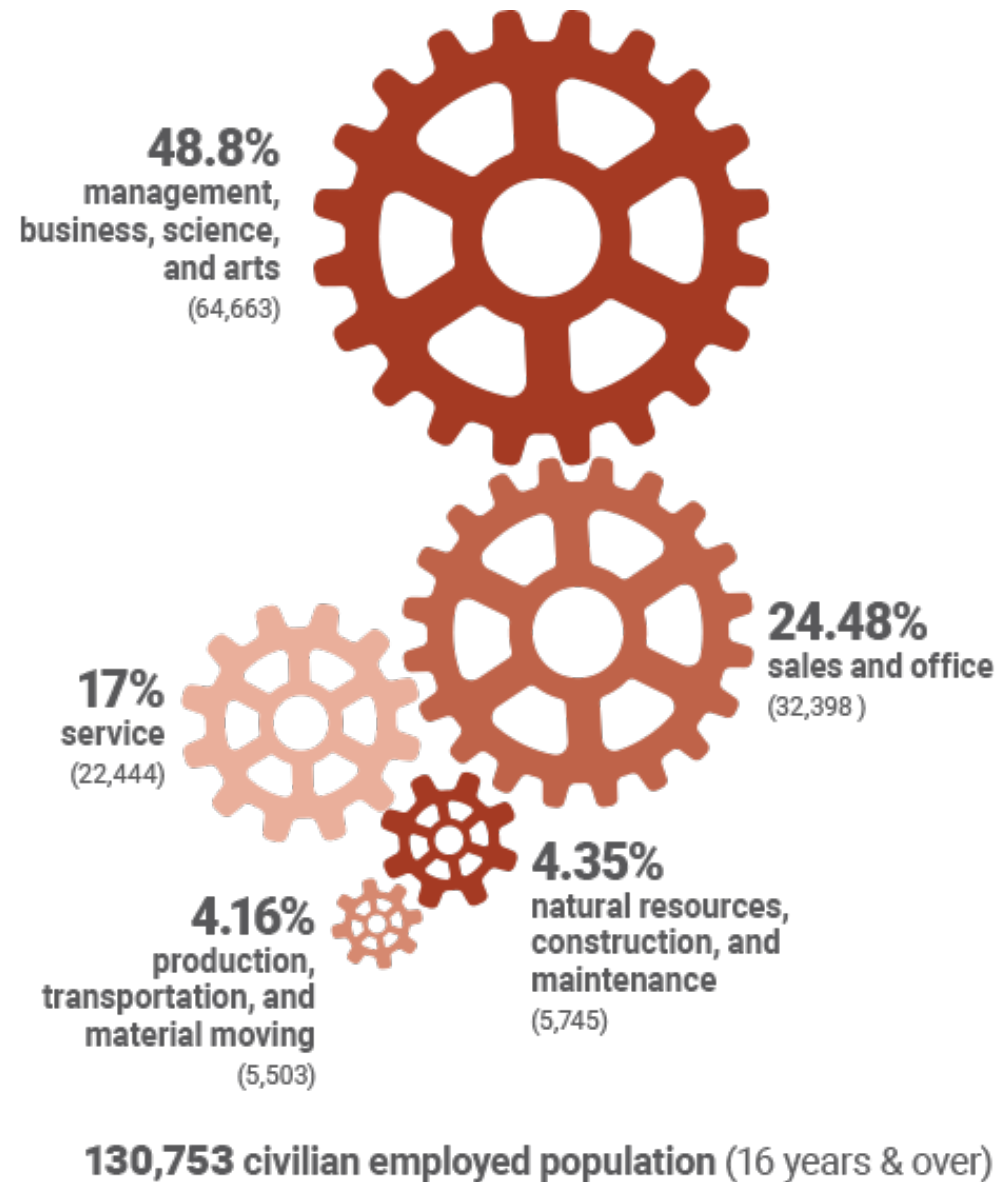

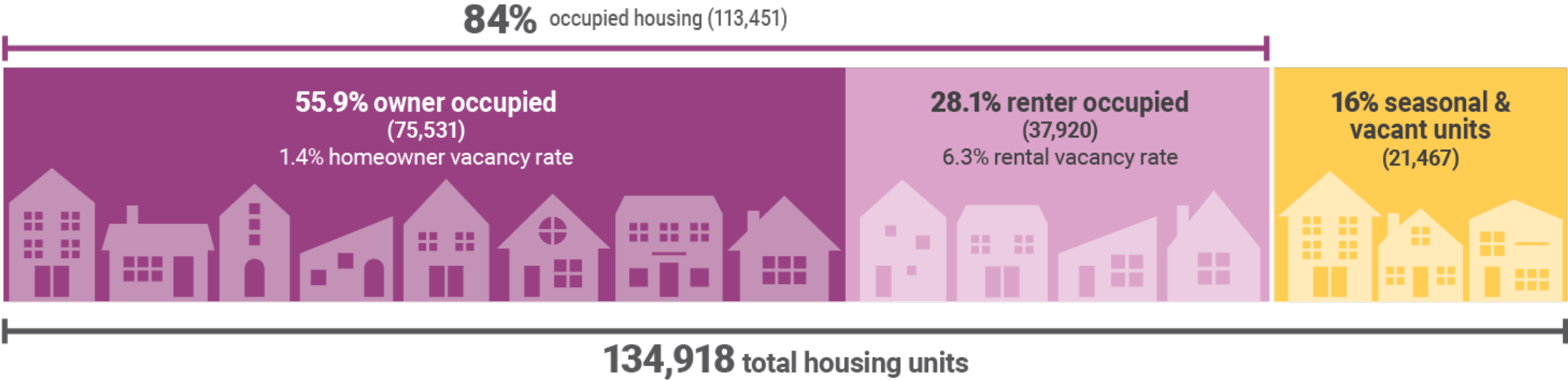

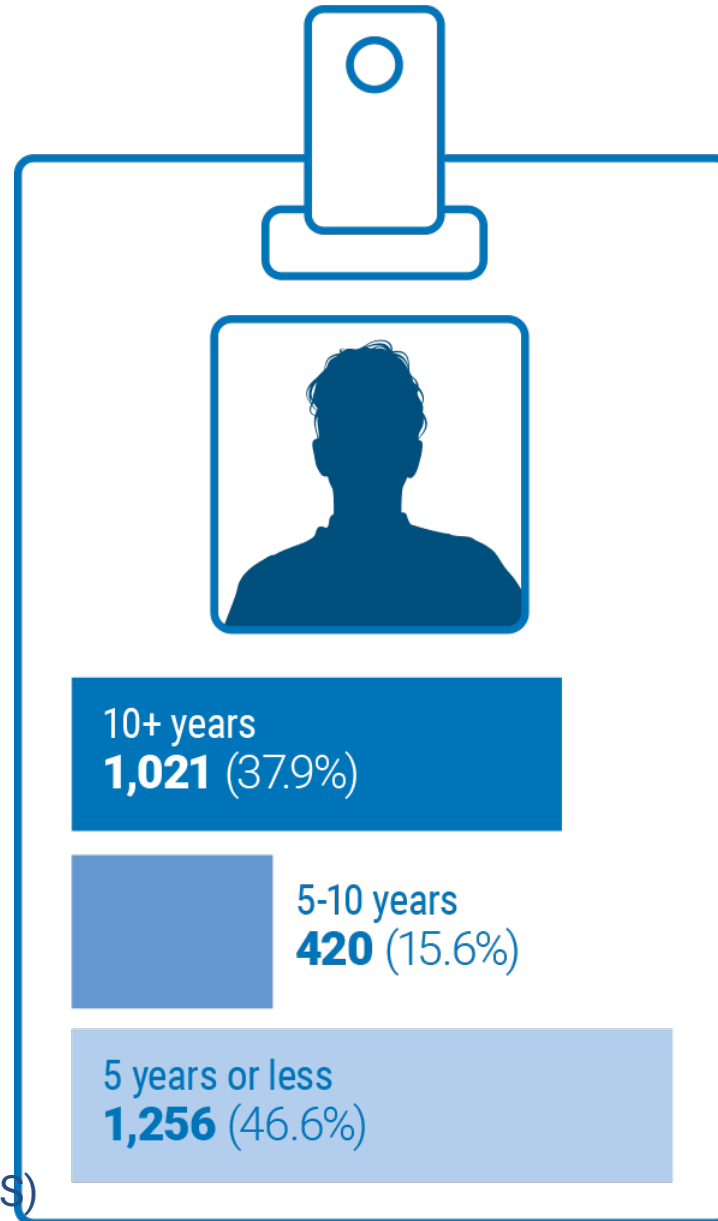

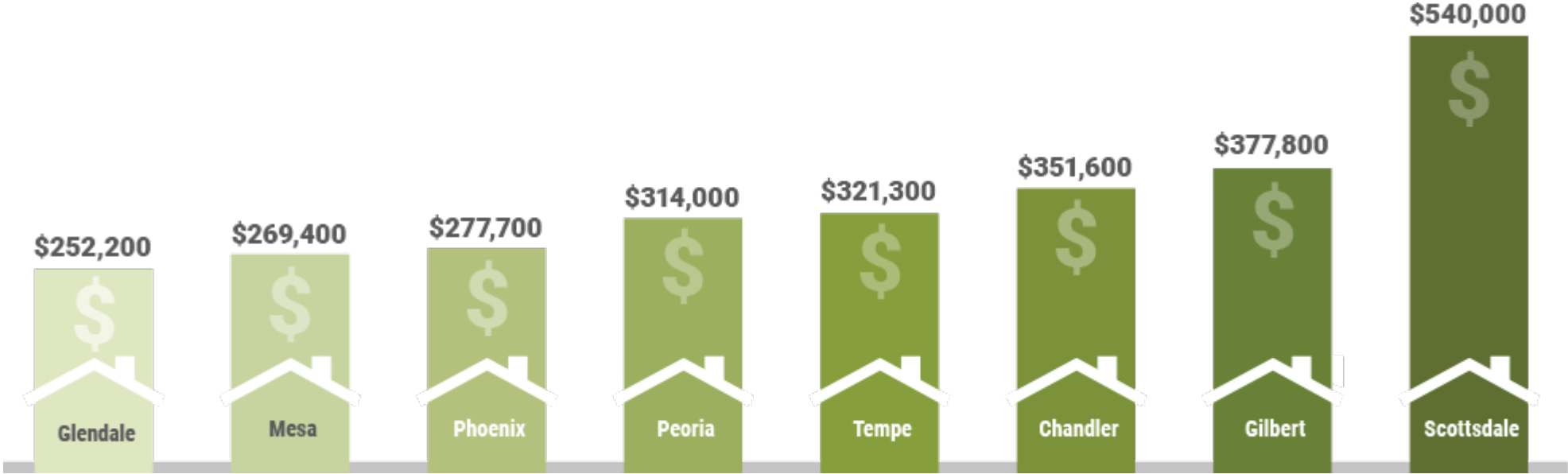

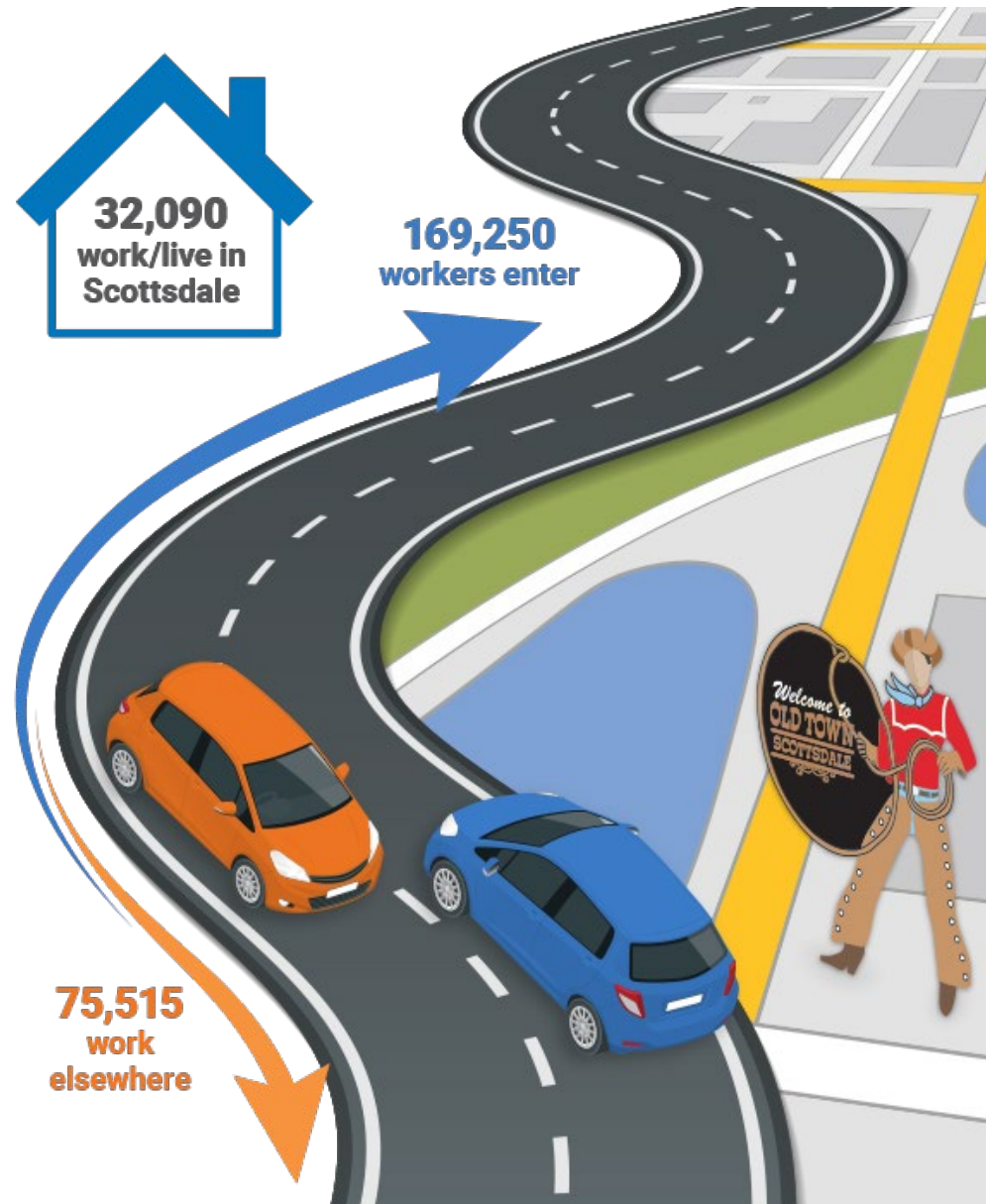

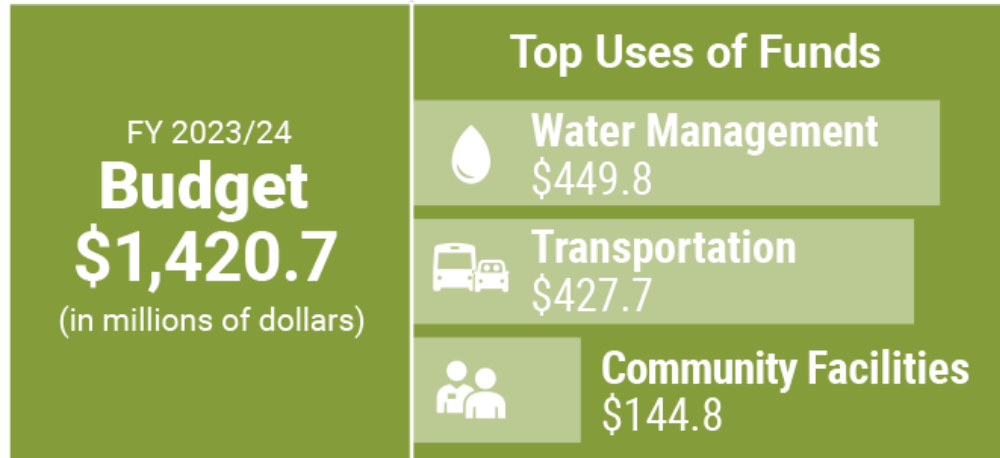
Scottsdale's Two Budgets

Funds long-term investments in the city such as building, acquisition and improvement of infrastructure and facilities.

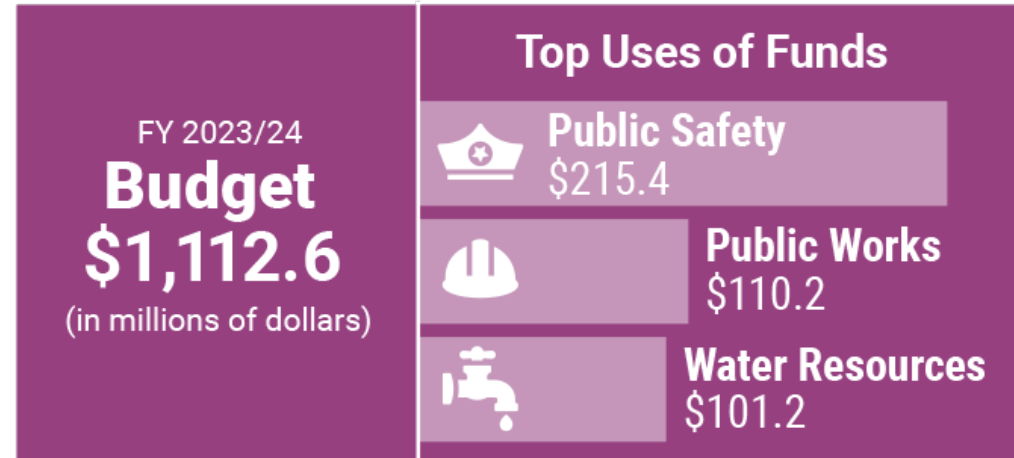

Funds the day-to-day city operations and services.



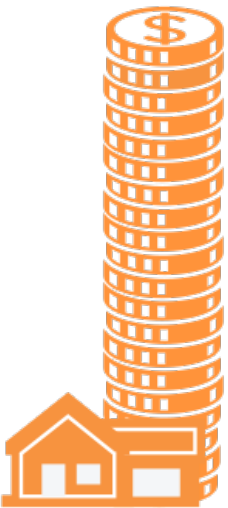

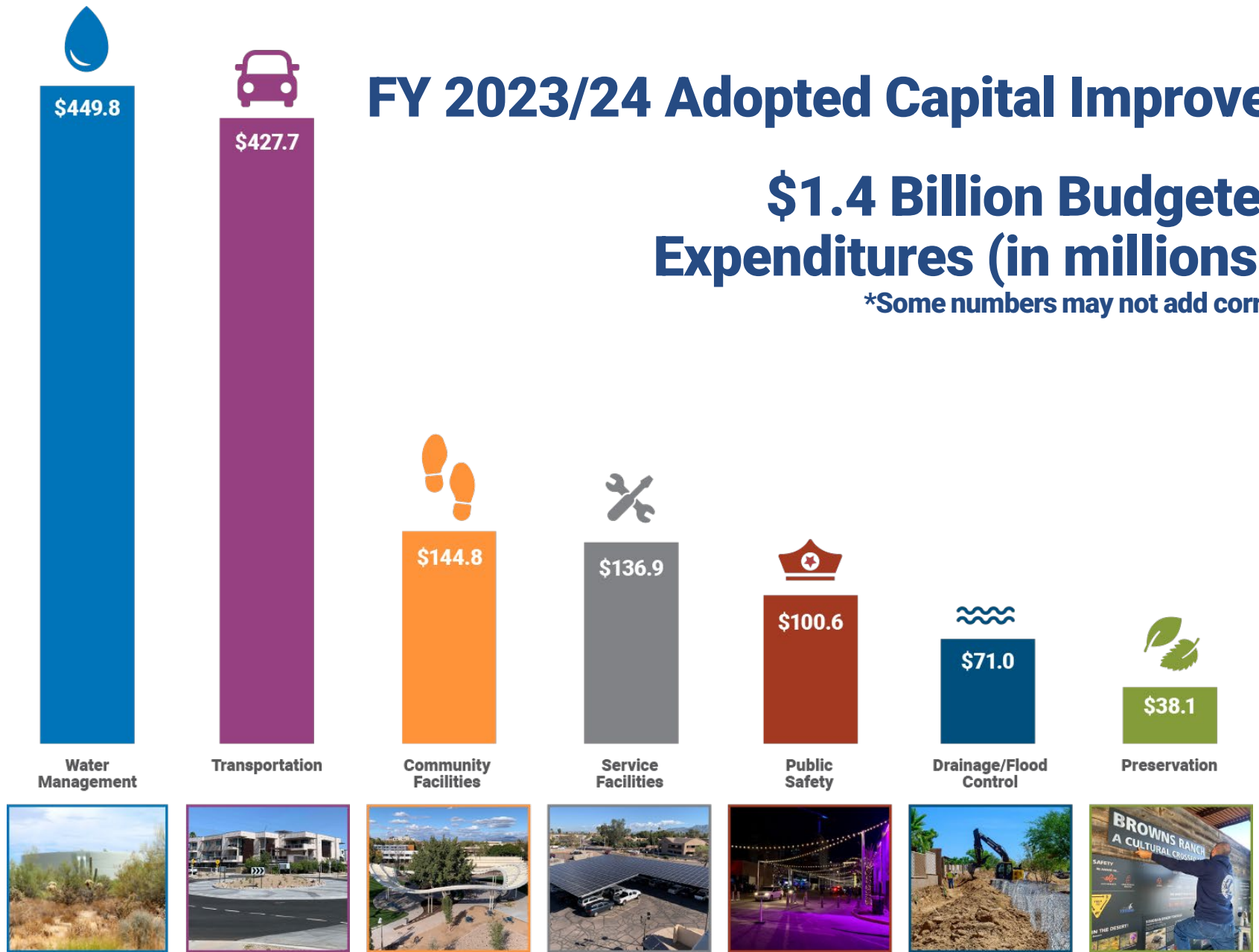

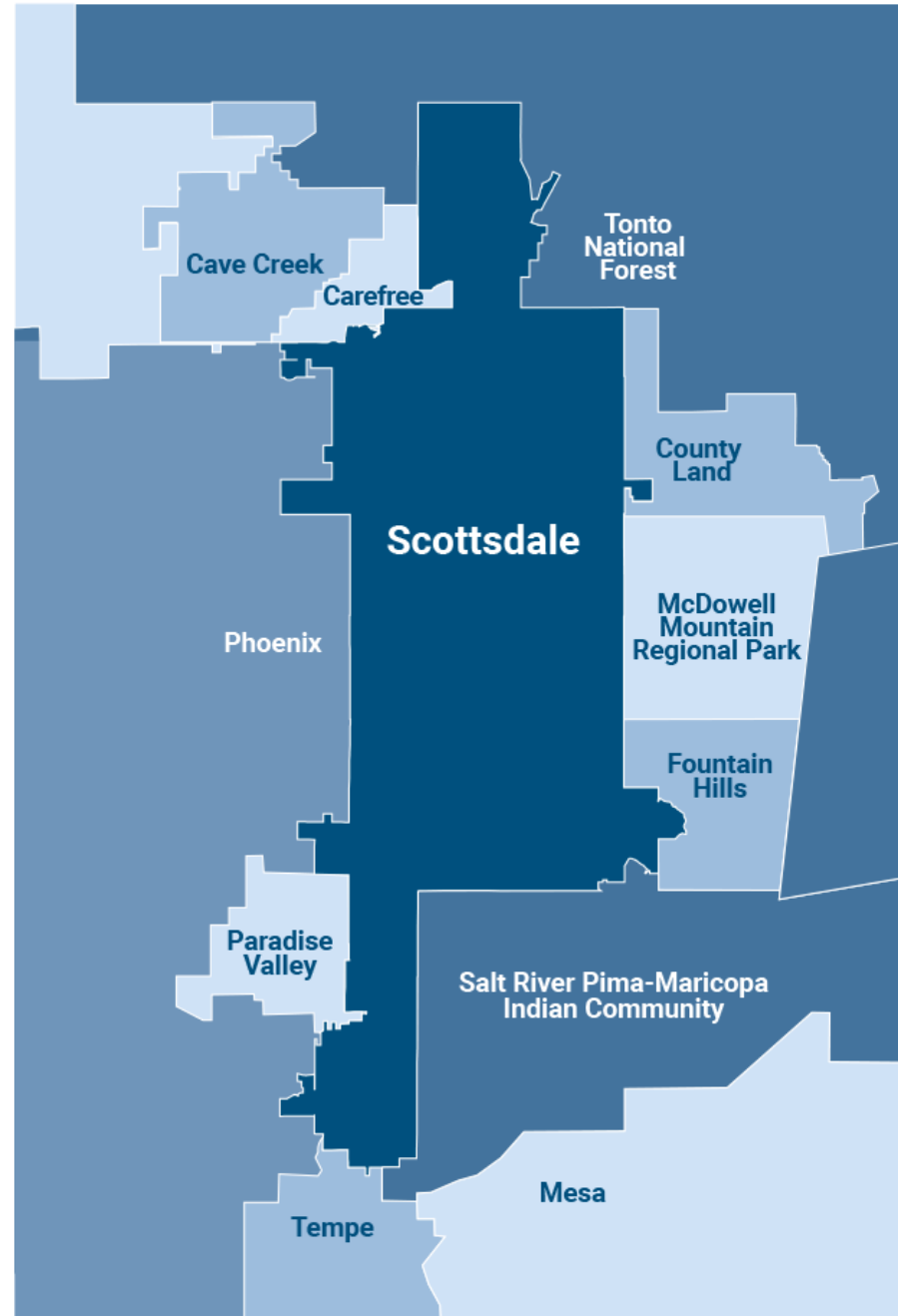
FY 2023/24 Adopted Capital Improvement Plan
