3. What you think is the top issue facing the Board or Commission to which you have applied.

The top issue which should be of most concern to the City of Scottsdale is that Board of Adjustment members do not always clearly identify or communicate which of the four statutory criteria have not been met before voting to deny a variance. Because the Board is a quasi-judicial body whose decisions are appealed not to the City Council but to Superior Court, it is imperative that the criteria be applied consistently and justly. I would address this issue by asking – on the record, during hearings – questions of my fellow board members that will elicit a reply stating explicitly which of the four statutory criteria have or have not been met.

There is another issue; it's not clear that all Board members are visiting all the sites before the hearings. Visiting the sites in person provides a much clearer understanding of the issues being presented than simply reviewing the packets provided by staff (although staff do a great job!).

They can notice an old bank and turn it into the next it-pizza restaurant! I would love to see Scottsdale use this approach. These destinations become so incredibly popular because they have such rich history but newly imagined. I'm a huge fan!

Some of the really cool things I have helped accomplish in my first term as a historic preservation commissioner:

- 1. We made Sands North our latest historic district. I consider my role in that to be very important, as I helped the hoa President best communicate and work with council.
- 2. We have been back Parada Del sol historic parade as a commission for the last 2 years. So fun!
- 3. My twin sister and I helped "save" the Polynesian Dairy Queen on McDowell to be recreated in an adaptative- reuse project 3 miles

- down the road. That project will be a rad tourist destination for being very instagramable and honoring our past. Everyone has a story about that place!
- 4. We helped save Ralph Haver triangle building from demolition to be worked into a large development project as an adapative reuse. That was a huge win! The original development team was not going to save the building. The new team hired an architect who immediately understood what they had.
- 5. Our commission has been working on an hpc communication plan to have video content for channel 11 and online to education our residents about who we are and what we can do for them. This has been years in the making and I would love to see it to completion. The more our residents understand these programs, the less angry folks you will have. Communication of this program is paramount to its success.
- 6. We have elevated historic properties within our community.
- 7. We have been successful in educating local owners to understand the treasures they have so they can make better decisions.
- 8. I have used my own money to purchase books for all on council and mayor on preservation in 2019 while working on Sands North. That's my level of passion to educate our community leaders on why preserving our history leads to a brighter future. We should be doing this better than Phoenix! I know we can.
- 9. We helped the surrounding community research the Blood services building and we have attributed it to TAA and Frank Lloyd Wright Foundation. I personally spoke to several in the Frank Lloyd Wright when doing my own research to help. That building was in escrow to be leveled for residential housing. I believe education stopped it.

Our commission gets along very well, works together very well and has a good flow. I'm so proud of our commission and our contributions to Scottsdale.

3. What you think is the top issue facing the Board or Commission to which you have applied.

The top issue facing our commission is development. We must continually grow and thrive as a city to compete. But, I believe we can create an incredibly prosperous future if we continue to protect and promote our historic assets and work them into our bright future. My family and I have lived in Scottsdale for 17 1/2 years. The first 12 years were near 58th St and Dynamite Blvd. My wife (Cathy) and I have lived in McCormick Ranch for the last 5 1/2 years.

2. How your experiences (education/professional/volunteer) relates to the Board or Commission to which you have applied.

My career consisted of 38 years in the packaging business, 33 of which were with the same company. I started as a sales representative and worked my way up to National Sales Manager/ Commercial Director for Pactiv LLC. At one point, I was responsible for \$500M in sales and a sales force numbering more than 50 sales managers and representatives. Besides having responsibility for hiring, training and directing the sales organization, I interacted with multiple levels of our customers' organizations (CEO/Owners of national companies down to branch management) in an effort to resolve issues and drive sales.

I believe the problem-solving, relationship building and communication skills I developed over this successful career will let me help the commission work through the various issues facing the city's McDowell Sonoran Preserve in the coming years. This includes working with the Preserve staff, as well as other city departments and outside agencies that will play a part in the Preserve's future.

At the end of 2016, I retired from Pactiv and joined the McDowell Sonoran Conservancy soon thereafter. I am currently in my last year

as Chair of the Patrol Program and am a member of the Core Leadership Team. As Patrol Chair, I am responsible for helping visitors safely enjoy the Preserve, recruitment and training of new patrollers, and overall direction of the 500+ patrollers in the program.  Name, address, and how long you've lived in Scottsdale. Dawn Abel, 2041 N. 87th Way, Villa 110. Have lived in Scottsdale since May 26th, 2015 (5-1/2 years).

2. How your experiences (education/professional/volunteer) relate to the Board or Commission to which you have applied.

Thank you for your nomination to this commission. I have lived in So. Scottsdale since 2015. I have noted numerous issues in the area since that time, largely to do with crime, vagrancy, vandalism and homelessness. I work as an industry contract communications consultant and am a real estate investor who understands the importance of protecting the value of our properties and neighborhoods. I have three degrees in Education and believe that educating people is the best way to resolve conflicts and our differences.

I have spent my life pondering how to address the issues of crime and homelessness. I've lived in very large urban centers all my life. In the distant past, I worked in drug rehab as an educational/vocational counselor and while in college, I was involved in gang conflict resolution. I've continued with conflict resolution as I've consistently taken resolution training and recently worked the de-escalation effort of the League of Women Voters, Metro Phoenix, in its election protection efforts. I am also on the Pima Villas HOA board, and have finally, after four hard years of providing evidence and legal mandates, prevailed in my attempts to hold every board member accountable for HOA community improvement. The original board, having lived here for 35 previous years, left us with major maintenance and repairs that I have taken the initiative to resolve. I proposed three financial plans that we voted on last night. We successfully passed the boldest of the three.

Because of the crime, vagrancy and homelessness, which particularly hits So. Scottsdale (in our alleys, our streets, and our blocks/ residences), I am up to the task of determining and developing new ways to address these issues head on and with compassion. But they will take private and government partnerships to make them happen. These include:

- A. Finding a commercial facility that can house the homeless near major transportation centers that have access to light rail and are away from residential areas. My objective is to provide time to transition those most at-risk back into residential areas, largely to protect the residential areas from crime and for the health and safety of the community.
- B. Creating partnerships with job shops to make short- and long-term hourly jobs available to those who need work at all skill levels. I have personal relationships with some of these job shops.
- C. Engaging mental health task forces that can address the problems of the homeless/mentally ill and get them into services. You are already doing this to a degree.
- D. Providing residents with additional toolkits and resources to keep their blocks safe. The objective is to fortify their neighborhoods for any type of emergency/disaster beyond ordinary street crime. You are already doing this to a degree.
- E. Implementing neighborhood alley security (gates, entry/exit cameras and/or patrols).
- F. Addressing and remedying the grafitti issues along McDowell Road and its side streets particularly at 87th Street (most obvious to me).
- G. Offering an incentive to proprietors to move the 87th Street@McDowell and McDowell@Pima Rd liquor stores to more commercial areas (**away from residences and bus stops where the homeless hang out and sleep**).
- H. Working with other commissions to resolve local traffic problems during high season.

Last, I am also FEMA certified to handle some neighborhood emergency management events if necessary. I am also a "worker bee" rather than just an "idea" person. I take action and am results driven.

3. What you think is the top issue facing the Board or Commission to which you have applied.

It appears that the commission is notably concerned about the homelessness; I'm guessing largely in So. Scottsdale. So. Scottsdale and downtown are the most commercial areas in the city and also seem to have the most crime. Additionally, that is where I live and I observe these problems on a daily basis, including on my own street and complex where there have been quite a few incidents with break-ins, attempted break-ins and homelessness, not to mention vagrant alley way traffic. That is also an issue that our HOA is attempting to remedy with our just-approved financial plan.

For over 38 years until June 2020, I was fully engaged in a career as a practicing attorney. During that time, I had the opportunity to represent a number of corporate entities (including publicly traded corporations), governmental entities and individuals in litigation matters in which safety and compliance with laws and regulations were predominant issues. Vehicular traffic and roadway design issues were addressed in a number of matters I was involved in.
